Distribution and Habitat

Gingin to Albany, growing in sandy, sandy-clay and lateritic soils in forests, woodlands and shrublands.
A remarkable disjunct population is known from Banks Rock east of Hyden.



Flowering Months

Description

A widespread species 150–250 mm high with four to eight leaves forming a ground-hugging or ascending basal rosette 12–24 mm across, three to six cauline leaves and one (rarely two) translucent, green and white flowers 5–6 mm across.

Distinguishing Features

It is often found growing with Karri Snail Orchid (*Pterostylis karri*) but is shorter with smaller flowers and has a shorter less prominently pointed dorsal sepal.
