Distribution and Habitat

Munglinup to Israelite Bay, growing in sandy-clay soil in woodlands and shrublands. In one area the <u>species</u> was found on a small granite outcrop nestled in a salt lake.

Description

A rare <u>species</u> 80–160 mm high with a loose, ascending <u>rosette</u> of leaves 10–30 mm across, two to six <u>cauline</u> leaves and one (rarely two) translucent, brown-marked, green and white flowers 8–10 mm across.

Distinguishing Features

It is distinguished from the similar Dwarf bird Orchid (Pterostylis galgulus), which also has small flowers with a short <u>dorsal sepal</u>, by its densely hairy <u>labellum</u> and easterly distribution.
